I went up to Three Maids Hill at the weekend, and was pleased to find that all was well. It was a mild day, just the usual force 10 blowing, and I was interested to compare the activity outside different hives. Most were pretty quiet, but a few were flying quite strongly. Sid used to say that you could learn a lot by just studying what was going on outside. I was hoping to see a bit of pollen going in, but they were just relieving themselves and fetching water. My stock in the garden have the benefit of some early snowdrops, but the crocuses are a week or more away. I have a recipe for pollen substitute, but have never used it.

If you find a stock which is too light for your liking, then weak syrup or diluted honey can be fed

in a contact feeder. A jar with a perforated lid, full of syrup, can be put directly on top of the brood frames. If the bees want it, they will take it. I was told not to disturb the cluster if the temperature was below 10 C., but just putting a jar on top should be OK. It would be a good time to put those carpet squares on top.

When walking out to admire the crocuses, collect any nice rotten wood you find, take it home and dry it. It makes the best (and cheapest) smoker fuel.

£4.3M BEE HEALTH FUNDING INCREASE

Defra News Release via Tim Ellison: "An extra £4.3 million to safeguard and undertake more research into the health of bees was announced by Environment Secretary Hilary Benn today.

Mr Benn said that nearly £2.3 million over the next two years would support the work of the National Bee Unit in its efforts to help England's beekeepers deal with the problems facing their bee colonies. This will include identifying all those who keep bees and providing expert advice to them on tackling pests and diseases and applying good husbandry.

In addition, Defra will put an extra £400,000 towards bee health research every year for the next five years. This extra funding - a total of £2 million - forms part of a comprehensive bee health strategy, which is under development."

Tim comments: "Short of the £8 million that was called for, but better than nothing."
